HISTORY

Originally located and activated at Naha Air Base, Japan on Aug. 10, 1948, the 51st Fighter Wing has continuously operated on the Korean peninsula since Nov. 1, 1971.

During its history, the 51st FW has been redesignated six times; and located at six different bases in the Pacific Theater.



The wing has flown 15 different types of fighter aircraft since activation, with the current air frames including the A-10C and F-16C/D.

In December 2008, the DoD changed the assignment policy for service members coming to Korea, which in turn opened hundreds of slots for Airmen to bring their families to Osan. Osan had 632 Command Sponsorship slots but have recently expanded to 860. Osan Air Base now offers many family friendly activities.


