Three Osan Airmen receive Articles 15

The military justice system is a commander's program designed to support good order and discipline in the unit and to ensure mission accomplishment.

When commanders decide to impose nonjudicial punishment, they can choose from a variety of punishments.

For enlisted members, that list includes reduction in rank, forfeiture of pay, restriction (e.g., to the base, from the clubs), extra duties and a reprimand. At some bases, correctional custody is also an option.

Officer could receive forfeiture of

pay, arrest in quarters, restriction, and a reprimand.

While the facts of some offenses appear similar, commanders take into account the member's duty performance, attitude, potential and disciplinary history, such as previous counselings, reprimands or nonjudicial punishments.

The following Airmen received Articles 15 between Aug. 17-21:

■ A senior airman accepted an Article 15 for resisting apprehension, exposing oneself and being drunk and disorderly. Punishment consisted of suspended reduction to the rank of airman 1st class, forfeiture of \$250.00 pay per month for two months, restriction to base and restriction from

facilities serving alcoholic beverages for 30 days and a reprimand.

■ An airman 1st class accepted an Article 15 for horse playing in the work area. Punishment consisted of forfeiture of \$824.00 pay per month for two months with one month suspended, 14 days extra duty and a reprimand.

■ An airman 1st class accepted an Article 15 for failing to go to work and failing to contact their unit after an appointment. Punishment consisted of suspended reduction to the rank of airman, forfeiture of \$784.00 pay per month for two months with one month suspended, restriction to base for 45 days, 45 days extra duty and a reprimand.

Don't be a victim of Phishing Scams: Be weary of suspicious e-mails

It's Monday morning and Senior Airman Jones has just logged into his computer to start his morning routine.

After a quick sip from his coffee, he eagerly opens his e-mail to see if his leave request to go to Hawaii next week has been approved.

While browsing through his inbox, he quickly notices an e-mail entitled "MYPAY ACCOUNT CONFIRMATION." Curious, he immediately opens the e-mail, not even paying attention to the address information.

The message contains instructions for him to reply to the sender with his PIN number and Social Security number in order to validate his credentials and ensure his military pay continues to be sent to the financial account on file.

Even though he notices some grammatical errors and garbled formatting while scanning the message, the thought of not receiving his money on pay day prompts him to immediately comply with the request without hesitation.

Unbeknownst to him, he has just fallen prey to a typical e-mail phishing scam, and right now someone is using his Social Security number and access PIN to gain entry to his financial information, and establish an allotment to their own private account.

Senior Airman Jones will be in for a rude awakening when he finds out his next paycheck is only \$15.

So, what measures can you take to prevent this from happening to you?

First, you need to pay attention to the source address of all messages in your inbox. Never open e-mails from unfamiliar addresses or questionable email addresses.

Phishing e-mails are typically sent from unfamiliar addresses, and contain a subject that looks familiar or enticing.

Second, reputable financial institutions never ask members to provide personal information, such as PIN numbers, over unsecure methods such as e-mail.

In the "MY PAY" phishing scenario above, Airman Jones failed to recognize that, not only was the e-mail sent from an unfamiliar address and contained grammatical errors, but it also asked him to provide private account information, such as his personal PIN number.

So, what procedures should you take if you receive an e-mail like Airman Jones?

First, if you suspect the e-mail may be a phishing scam or contain a virus, do not open it.

Immediately contact your unit/group Client Support Administrator, Information Assurance Officer, or the 51st Communication Squadron Helpdesk at 784-2666.

If you believe that your computer has been infected with a virus, immediately disconnect your system from the network, but do not power the computer down.

Also, refer to the 51st Fighter Wing Network Incident Reporting Aid for further guidance/instructions.

Knowing the common indicators of an email phishing scam can help keep you from getting hooked!

Tips:

- First, if you suspect the e-mail may be a phishing scam or contain a virus, DO NOT OPEN IT
- Immediately contact your CSA
- If you believe that your computer has been infected with a virus, immediately disconnect your system from the network, but DO NOT power the computer down.

Osan's Airfield Damage Repair team exercises with ROKAF

JUNGWON AIR BASE, Republic of Korea – Airmen of the 51st Civil Engineer Squadron airfield damage repair team participated in a combined-rapid-runway-repair-training exercise Aug. 19, with the Republic of Korea Air Force's 19th Tactical Fighter Wing and 91st Air Civil Engineer Group at Jungwon Air Base, Republic of Korea.

"This is the first time 51st CES has participated in this kind of exercise or training with the ROKAF," said Master Sgt. Christopher Belknap, 51st CES non-commissioned officer in charge of structures.

The exercise scenario was the airfield was hit by two scud missiles or mortar rounds. The ROKAF and USAF personnel had to come together as one, to repair the damaged airfield as quickly as possible and get planes back into the fight.

During the exercise 93 members from the 91st ACEG, 19th TAW and 51st CES filled two craters at the same time. The 91st ACEG supplied the engineer support while the 51st CES team was in charge of the folded fiberglass mat team and measuring the compaction quality of one of the two craters.

With the help of more than 40 pieces of equipment and 107 people, the craters were completed in two and a half hours; however, that's not all the team accomplished during the mission.

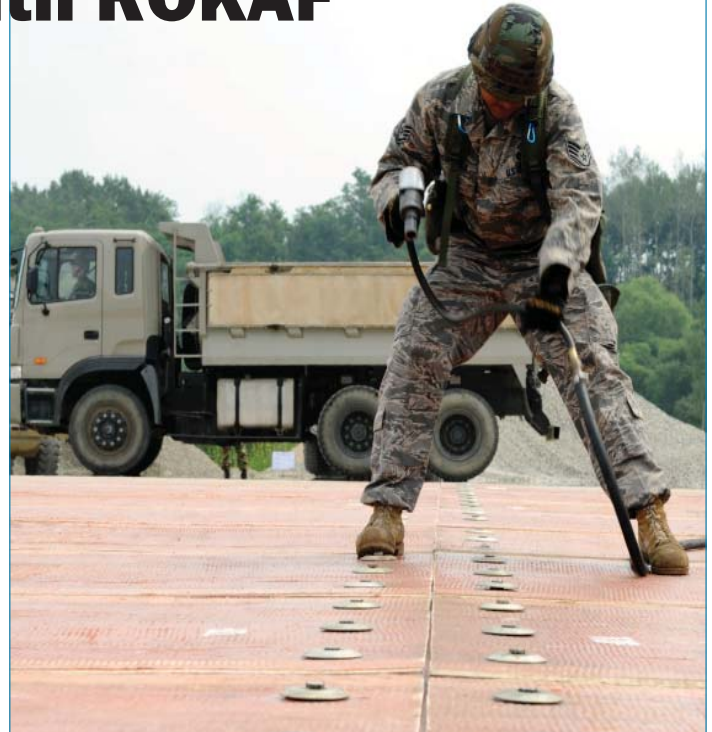
"The significance of 51st CES efforts clearly had a positive impact," said Maj. Bradley Johnson 51st CES operations flight commander. "They demonstrated techniques and procedures that will enhance how our ROKAF partners recover their bases. Moreover, their professionalism strengthened relations with our host nation comrades. I believe we came back with a better understanding of how the ROKAF operates and took away some good nuggets that we can apply to improve our processes."

He went on to say the two units plan to continue combined training operations to standardize and strengthen both sides in the future.

The runway repair training was part of the peninsula wide exercise called Ulchi Freedom Guardian, a joint, combined exercise that began August 10 and brought more than 550 military members to the Republic of Korea.



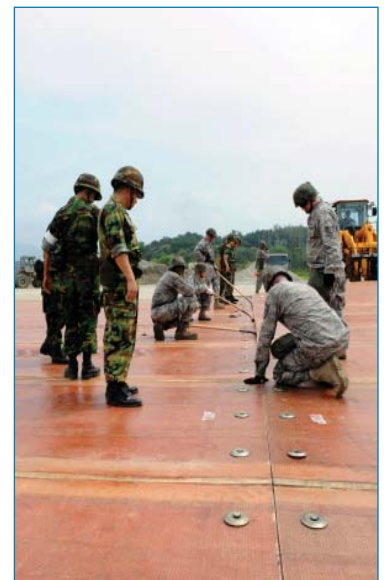
Airmen from the 51st Civil Engineer Squadron stand in formation before participating in a joint combined-rapid-runway-repair-training exercise Aug. 19.

Redesigned NCO retraining program underway

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas – The 2010 Noncommissioned Officer Retraining Program has a new look and focus as the Air Force seeks to fill approximately 1,124 shortage career field and special duty positions.

The entire program has been reduced from nine months to 120 days to better serve both Airmen and the Air Force and began Aug. 19.

NCOs given the opportunity to retrain will be notified by memorandum and must then submit their career field or special duty choices by Oct. 20.

According to Master Sgt. Deitra V. Mathis, the Air Force Personnel Center's enlisted retraining section superintendent, there are a couple key improvements to this year's program that should give Airmen more control and flexibility over their career path than previous years.

"We've streamlined the program by constraining fiscal year 2010's program to 120 days versus the previous year, which ran about nine months," said Sergeant Mathis.

"We believe this will have a smaller foot print on the Air Force, thus enhancing mission accomplishment and benefiting more Airmen."

Another improvement Airmen should take advantage of is initiating voluntary actions during Phase I of the program that make them ineligible for retraining like volunteering for a 365-day deployment, permanent change of station, Physician Assistance and Officer Pre-Commissioning Program, separation, or retirement.

However, Airmen are encouraged to concurrently volunteer for retraining in the event their voluntary action is not approved.

Sergeant Mathis also stated that disqualified Airmen with a 9A000 Reporting Identifiers can now apply for NCO Retraining Program quotas that are not otherwise restricted.

"This is another improvement to the program since in previous years our 9A000 disqualified Airmen could only get those last minute, hard to fill quotas," she said.

NCOs can best control the course of their future Air Force careers by taking action during the voluntary phase of NCORP.

"Many Airmen fail to act during the voluntary phase and then find themselves in the involuntary NCORP phase," said Sergeant Mathis.

"Last year, Airmen who did not submit the mandatory package in Phase I were given an [Air Force Specialty Code] based on their qualifications and the needs of the Air Force."

If the voluntary phase fails to meet requirements to fill shortage career fields and special duty positions, then Air Force senior leaders will implement Phase II of the program to begin involuntary retraining.

In Phase II, eligible individuals in AFSCs not meeting retraining-out objectives, and without approved retraining or assignment to a special duty identifier by Oct. 12, will have an AFSC assigned involuntarily based on the individual's qualifications and the needs of the Air Force.

AFPC officials will post a list of eligible NCOs by grade and AFSC on the virtual Military Personnel Flight Web site.

The secure site can be accessed through the Air Force Portal or the AFPC "Ask" Web site.

Military personnel sections will manage the retraining program and also notify members if they are eligible.

Additionally, they will suggest special duty positions like recruiting, postal duty, military training instructor or professional military education instructor.

"It's important for all Airmen to understand once they are identified for retraining in Phase I that they remain eligible for Phase II unless they are retrained, released or separated from military service," said Sergeant Mathis.

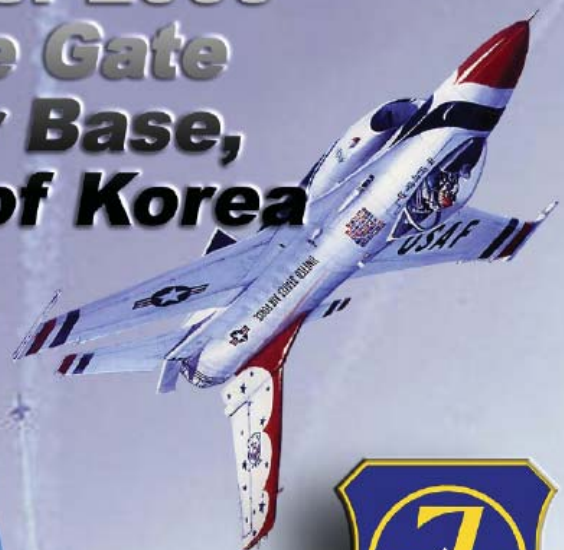
